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KASICH SIGNS ELEVEN BILLS INTO LAW

COLUMBUS—Today Gov. John R. Kasich signed the following pieces of legislation into law:

Am. Sub. SB 1 (Beagle & Balderson) creates the OhioMeansJobs Workforce Development Revolving Loan Fund, creates the OhioMeansJobs Workforce Development Revolving Loan Program, allocates a portion of casino license fees to finance the loan program, and makes an appropriation;

SB 38 (Schiavoni) designates the first week in October as "Nonviolence Week;"

Am. SB 57 (Manning) establishes a one-year pilot project in Lorain County pursuant to which qualified emergency responders in that County may obtain and administer naloxone to revive a person suffering from an apparent opioid-related overdose;

Sub. SB 64 (Beagle & Manning) prohibits under the offense of criminal child enticement an offender, for an unlawful purpose and without privilege, consent, or a public safety or education-related employment, from soliciting, coaxing, enticing, or luring the child to accompany the offender and declares an emergency;

Am. SB 66 (Hite) revises the Agricultural Commodity Handlers Law;

Am. SB 112 (Beagle) extends the authority of municipal corporations and counties to enter into enterprise zone agreements with businesses until October 15, 2015, and establishes an enterprise zone program review council to evaluate the effectiveness of the enterprise zone program and make recommendations as to its renewal;

Sub. HB 2 (Derickson & Brown) requires an unemployment compensation claimant to register with OhioMeansJobs to be eligible for unemployment compensation benefits and requires a claimant to contact a local one-stop office beginning with the eighth week after filing an application for unemployment compensation benefits;

HB 14 (Pelanda) amends and enacts sections of the R.C. with respect to a school district's withholding or transfer to another district or school of the records of a child who is alleged or adjudicated an abused, neglected, or dependent child;

Sub. HB 37 (Duffey & Scherer) creates the SharedWork Ohio Program, creates a monetary penalty for individuals who commit fraud to obtain unemployment compensation benefits, charges an employer's account when actions of the employer led to an improper payment of unemployment compensation benefits, and declares an emergency;

Am. HB 112 (Schuring & Gonzales) allows taxpayers to contribute a portion of their income tax refunds to the Ohio Breast and Cervical Cancer Project and requires each income tax refund contribution category to generate \$150,000 annually or be canceled;

Sub. HB 138 (McClain & Letson) makes changes to the law governing the Board of Tax Appeals, including authorizing a small claims docket within the Board, requiring the Board to adopt rules to manage appeals and operate a mediation program, requiring the Board to receive notices of appeal and statutory transcripts electronically, providing pleading standards for appeals to the Board, and expressly authorizing the Board to consider motions.

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
